FONKOZE

Dan Falco of Lehigh Valley Monthly Meeting would like to invite you to join people from the Philadelphia area to celebrate and support FONKOZE, Haiti's Bank for the Poor on **Thursday evening October 14th** beginning at **6pm** at the Center for Architecture, 1218 Arch Street, Philadelphia PA 19107.

The formation of FONKOZE was based in part on the success of Muhammad Yunus (Banker to the Poor and Nobel Prize Winner) and his organization, Grameen Bank.

Haiti is the poorest country in the western hemisphere and one of our closet neighbors. They must deal with natural disasters like floods and hurricanes as well as coups and other unwanted interventions. Their situation has become so desperate that many have resorted to eating something called "mud cookies". A ball of mud is flattened, mixed with a little butter and salt and left to bake in the street until it hardens. The women typically eat these so their families can have what little "real" food is available.

FONKOZE is prepared to support these "poorest of the poor" by providing small loans and support in an effort to improve their lives. It is a remarkable organization that has been growing in Haiti for a decade and a half. When I found out they were planning an event in Philadelphia, I wanted to become involved with raising this issue within the Quaker Community.

If an individual commits to being a responsible member, FONKOZE will ensure the following: You and your family will have food in your stomachs everyday.

You will know how to read and write.

All of your children will be in school.

You will have a cement floor, tin roof and a latrine.

You will have assets that you can see accumulate everyday (land, buildings, animals, savings).

You will have the confidence to face your future, no matter what it holds.

WHAT AN APRON IS

This lovely sentiment comes to us from a Plumstead Meeting Friend. Thank you.

“ I don't think our children know **WHAT AN APRON IS**. The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath, because she only had a few; it was easier to wash aprons than dresses and they used less material, but along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven. It was wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion was even used for cleaning our dirty ears.

From the chicken coop, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven. When company came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids. And when the weather was cold, grandma wrapped it around her arms. Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove.

Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron. From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls. In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron dust in a matter of seconds, When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace the “old time apron” that served so many purposes.”

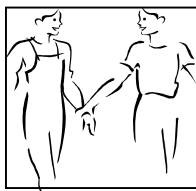

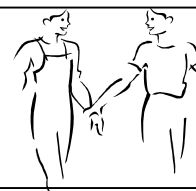
