Meet, Greet, and Eat Day at Newtown MM for member to meet new attendees. Seventy persons attended. Challenge of growth at this meeting will require a long range plan to keep the heart of those attending.

Bristol MM hosted "Occupy Wall Street" walkers on their way to Washington.

Fallsington MM participated on Historic Fallsington Day. Gave out "Quaker" oatmeal cookies and had the display from PYM on Quakers and the political process. "Outreach and Communication" committee is a new committee that was involved in the preparation.

Southampton MM has started a Tuesday evening meeting for worship.

Buckingham MM hosted the Bucks Quarter Peace Fair. September 22, 2012 is the date for next year.

Ouakertown MM has a presence on Facebook.

Yardley MM working on the Children's Religious Education curriculum and is experiencing a growing group of youngsters. Members have received training from PYM in Godly Play and Faith and Play.

Report of Coordinator: Report given by Holly Olson (Middletown Meeting). Complete report is available. The "Inreach" portion of the report was an account of the various activities that the Coordinator was involved that have occurred or are scheduled. "Outreach" portion report noted changes in the practice of staffing the BQM table for street fairs around BQM. "Intervisitation" portion listed the various Quaker programs and meetings attended with a positive review given for the Speakers Series at Doylestown and the Peace and Justice Film Series at Buckingham. Holly reported that Abington Quarter is invited to the New Year's Eve Skating Party. She also read the minute that was passed at Interim Meeting in support of the Occupy Philadelphia. Information was provided on the activity going on in Philadelphia between the Friends Center, AFSC and the Occupy Movement and ways that Friends can become involved.

Treasurer's Report given by Tim Dwyer (Bristol Meeting). An explanation was provided regarding the over budgeted expense under BQM Administrative costs as the purchase of a computer and Quick Books program to be used by the Treasurer.
