PRAYER COURSE ~ LIVING A PRAYERFUL LIFE

"Living A Prayerful Life" is a prayer course that was developed by a Peter Lang of Summit Chatham MM specifically with Friends in mind. For George Fox and early Friends prayer was described as inward retirement, "waiting upon the Lord". In our modern, high-tech, busy world it often appears that prayer and living have come to be widely separated. No matter what stage of life that we find ourselves in, true prayer offers the opportunity to grow deeper in Quaker faith and become open to the Power of God's love.

The three-fold purpose of the Prayer Course is to lead us to a deeper relationship with God, to discern how prayer leads to action and to deepen the spiritual life of our meetings. This will be an experiential program in the tradition of our Quaker search for truth. The participants will be asked to commit themselves to a period of daily prayer, to keep a prayer journal and to hold each other in the Light during the Prayer Course.

"Living A Prayerful Life" will consist of four sessions, which will include presentations, discussion and the practice of prayer. It will be an open forum in that questions and comments are encouraged throughout the program. Although Friends are encouraged to attend all four sessions, as we will be making a commitment to prayer and to each other, each session is also a separate unit and you are welcome to attend as many as possible.

Therefore, come and join us on this amazing journey as we learn how to look at and practice prayer in new and exciting ways. You may be surprised at what happens to you!

Friends gathered around the appointed hour of 1:00 PM and settled into a period of worship

Agenda reviewed, modified and accepted

Roll Call of Meetings: Bristol:1, Buckingham:2, Doylestown:0, Fallsington: 7, LehighValley: 1, Makefield: 4, Middletown:2, Newtown: 4, Plumstead: 2, Quakertown NJ: 0, Solebury: 2, Southampton: 0, Wrightstown: 1, Yardley: 5. There were two visitors from East Africa Yearly Meeting in Kenya currently attending Lehigh Valley MM: Zibiah and Allen Amiani.

Minutes approved with one clarification noted.

Growth and Sharing

- Yardley MM participation in Yardley Day resulted in a couple of new visitors the following First Day.
- Sam Snipes noted that The Peace Center in Langhorne has very few Friends involved.
- Fallsington: Monthly Meeting Outreach Committee involved in Historic Fallsington Day which this year had double attendance for tours. Have also started a specific Welcome Day for members to invite others.
- Makefield has been laying a foundation by improving community. The community is now at the stage to host a Quarterly Meeting next year.

Coordinators Report presented by Holly Olson (Middletown MM). Holly reported that the Spirituality and the Final Third of Life program was a success. She also reported on the Quarterly Pastoral Care Meetings, Clerk's Meetings and Religious Education Meetings. Outreach festival and fairs were well attended. Peace Fair was a great success and has made a profit this year.

Special Recognition was given to Donna Allen (Newtown MM). She has been donating \$790 in advertising space every year for BQM to advertise in the Times Publishing magazines.

Interim Meeting Report: David Rose recapped the saga of the minute supporting Religious Diversity, originally created to in response to HR 535 "Year of the Bible" but then rewritten in support of HR 771 declaring a "Year of Religious Diversity". PYM at last Interim Meeting approved the minute that opposes governmental preference in matters of religious conviction.

Newtown MM Annual Report given by Wendy Kane, incoming clerk. Wendy highlighted the current discussion regarding internal communication. Also highlighted was the clearness committee that met to discuss the "Fivefold Path to Peace" proposed by Paul Kester. A member of the PYM Peace and Concerns SC shared that the committee had approved the proposal and passed it on for Yearly Meeting consideration.

Plumstead MM Annual Report given by Beth Taylor, clerk. Beth highlighted that the meeting has a concern about the safety of drivers going around the bend in front the meeting as a number of have missed the bend and driven off the road. Members are constructing a berm. The meetinghouse recently served as a movie location for "The North Star", a film under production. A "cushion project" will be started to replace the current old and mismatched cushions.

Camp Onas Report given by Beth Taylor (Plumstead MM). The report contained a breakdown of Camper Statistics, Quaker Meeting participation, and financial aid granted. Sue Gould retired this year as Director and the transition has been made to Holly Hecht. Work has been completed on a digitized album of Camp Onas pictures and historical records called "The Onas Chronicle". A "**Minute of Appreciation for Suzan Neiger Gould**" was presented It was agreed that the entire **Minute would be included in the record of this Quarterly Meeting**. Friends can contribute to Camp Onas both individually and through their Meeting. Each Meeting should have two representatives on the Camp Board. Friends were reminded that registration is coming out shortly and Camp is usually fully booked by March.

The explanation provided for the large amount already spent from the Operating expense line item is the purchase of a computer for the Coordinator.

Budget and Nomination Report given by Betsy Bayardi (Wrightstown MM): Monthly Meeting Treasurers throughout the Quarter have regularized their giving pattern which is a great help in planning. There is a need for representation on the Chandler Hall Board, especially for someone with construction experience. Quaker School at Horsham also has a need for representation on their Board. Betsy will be reaching out to Monthly Meetings for Assistant Treasurer recommendations.

Outreach update given by Kellie Schluskel-Edens (Yardley MM). Outreach brochure needs to be updated. A minute to the PYM Membership Development Support fund in support of the project was presented and approved.
